## **"PACEM IN TERRIS" 50<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY CONFERENCE FIFTY YEARS LATER: "IF YOU WANT PEACE, WORK FOR JUSTICE"**

In his landmark 1963 papal encyclical *Pacem in Terris* – Peace on Earth – Pope John XXIII called on "all people of good will" to respond to issues of injustice in the modern world. This conference brings four distinguished speakers to speak about the intersection of contemporary faith and ethics issues. Rev. Richard Ryscavage, SJ, is an international expert on immigration and refugees. He is the former executive director of the U.S. Catholic Bishops Office for Migration and Refugee Services and former director of Jesuit International Refugee Services in Rome. His talk is entitled *Global Human Development and the Evolution of Catholic Social Teaching: From Pacem in Terris to Pope Francis* and takes place Friday from 5 - 7 p.m. Br. Dave Andrews, C.S.C., is senior representative for Food & Water Watch and the former executive director of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference. His

talk is entitled *Catholic Social Teaching and Energy Policy* and takes place Saturday from 11 a.m. - 1 p.m. Cheryle Kennedy is serving her fifth term on the Tribal Council of the Grand Ronde. She is the former commissioner of the Commission on Indian Services (appointed by the Oregon Legislature). Her talk *The Delisting and Restoration of Tribal Status by the Grand Ronde*, is Saturday from 2 - 4 p.m. The Most Rev. William S. Skylstad served as president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops 2004-07 and was the primary author of the Northwest Bishops' statement on the Columbia River watershed: *Caring for Creation and the Common Good*. His talk *Peace through Justice – The Right Ordering of Relationships in Our Environment* takes place Saturday from 5 - 7 p.m. All talks are free, open to the public, and held in Buckley Auditorium. Sponsored by the McNerney-Hanson Endowed Chair in Ethics, Molter Endowed Chair in Science, and Catholic Studies Program.

Alan Shapiro is the author of 11 collections of poetry. Shapiro has explored family, loss, domesticity, and the daily aspects of people's lives in free verse and traditional poetic forms. Shapiro's most recent book of poems is *Night of the Republic*. His poetry frequently appears in *The New Yorker*. His memoir *The Last Happy Occasion* (1997), was nominated for a National Book Critics Circle award. Shapiro is also the author of a collection of essays on poetry, *In Praise of the Impure: Poetry and the Ethical Imagination: Essays, 1980–1991*. He has won the Kingsley Tufts Award, the Los Angeles Book Prize, and a Lila Wallace – *Reader's Digest Writers' Award*. During Bill Clinton's presidency, Shapiro was invited to read his work at the White House. Shapiro has taught at Stanford University and the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. # Policies & Procedures

## **FOR OFFICE OF ALUMNI RELATIONS EVENTS**

### **TRAVEL & LOCAL EXCURSIONS**

In order to reserve your place on any of the local or international travel excursions, you must complete the following before the reservation date:

- 1) Notify the Office of Alumni Relations of your intent to attend and the number of people in your party.
- 2) Submit a deposit equaling at least half of the total listed trip cost. If submitting deposit for more than one person, please submit at least half of the total trip cost for each person who is to attend. The remaining balance is due to the University of Portland at least two weeks before the first day of the offered trip (see specific due dates listed by events).

### **REFUNDS AND CANCELLATIONS**

- 1) A full refund of paid funds will be issued for any trip cancelled by the University after payment is made.
- 2) For international and multi-day travel, deposits are non-refundable after the reservation date.
- 3) For local travel, 50% refunds will be issued up until 10 days prior to the date of the excursion. Beyond that date, the full cost of the reservation will be forfeited.

### **ALUMNI EVENTS: SENIOR AND EMPLOYEE DISCOUNT**

We invite all University of Portland alumni and friends over the age of 60 to enjoy a 10% discount on all alumni events. Employees are eligible to participate at cost. This discount does not apply for the Broadway series, the State of UP luncheon, and domestic or international trips.
