Thoughts from the Chair



I've been thinking a lot about what is important in life, what I can control, and what is meaningful. I hope you get space in this semester to reflect on these things yourself.

When I teach Democratization, I introduce the idea that in order for democracies to function well, there must be a critical mass of the citizenry that is willing to be reflexive thinkers, committed not only to their own interests, but to the health of the democracy itself. I know those people exist within the US. However, it can be difficult to have faith when some of the loudest voices are those that spew hatred, violence, and selective amnesia about our past. The key for those of us who believe in a better society is to avoid becoming too cynical and to keep the issues front and center. I encourage you to listen to the *Fresh Air* episode with Bryan

<u>Stevenson</u>, lawyer, author of *Just Mercy*, and the founder of the *Equal Justice Initiative*. He speaks about the need to acknowledge and atone for our collective past, something we as a nation have avoided.

I appreciate this quote from the Italian political Scientist Giovanni Sartori "what democracy is cannot be separate from what democracy should be. A democracy exists only insofar as its ideals and values bring it into being...in a democracy the tension between fact and value reaches the highest point, since no other ideal is further from the reality in which it has to operate." It reminds me to stay away from dualistic thinking and focus on furthering democratic principles to achieve those ideals.

I hope you can both enjoy the blessings of living within a democracy, while also at the same time, critically assess it so that we hold the power brokers accountable. Be that reflexive thinker that helps our democracy achieve its ideals.

And, get outside to watch life unfold. The daffodils are shooting up out of the ground, the camellias are budding, and soon the cherry blossoms will be in full view. Don't forget to enjoy the beauty of life, even as the challenges keep coming.

Dr. G in Chile: Third International Forum on Migration Statistics!



"Behind every number, there is a person. We must not forget that." With this appeal, António Vitorino, Director General of the International Organization for Migration (IOM), opened the 3rd International Forum on Migration Statistics, hosted by the UN Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean in Santiago, Chile, from January 24 to 26, 2023. The Forum brought together 600+ migration experts from around the world to discuss how to improve data for better policy.


Our very own, Dr. Lara-Zuzan Golesorkhi, was one of these experts and shared her knowledge and practice regarding migration and gender as part of the <u>session</u> titled, "Data to understand and unravel the migration-gender nexus." Her presentation focused on the Gender-Migration Index (GMI), a policy guidance tool that centers lived experiences of women, girl, LGBTQIA+, and gender diverse migrants by strengthening civil society engagement in international review processes. The index is based on an indicator system that ensures gender-responsiveness and migrant-inclusion in benchmarking policy, particularly in regards to monitoring and evaluation. Four UP alumni, including Political Science majors, previously conducted case study analysis using this tool in the lead-up to their participation in the UN International Migration Review Forum in May 2022 (see UP Instagram Account Story UP@UN).
