Sample Syllabus

Reviving Alberta: Exploring Patterns of Gentrification and Displacement within Portland, Oregon

Course Description

In this course, students will explore the history of the once flourishing BIPOC community NE Alberta. Focusing on themes of displacement and gentrification, we will break down and analyze the assumptions made about Portland. Students will understand Portland's exclusionary development and infrastructure policy. The research and analysis practices set in the classroom will be exercised through the immersive final project involving a detailed walkthrough of the Alberta neighborhood. **Our final module question will be**: How can UP help foster racial integration on and off campus for the community of Portland?

Learning Objectives

- I. Outline the development of Alberta concerning infrastructure policy set by the Portland City Council.
- II. Explain how and why cities can be both diverse and segregated.
- III. Identify and analyze the cycle of gentrification and displacement among BIPOC in NE Portland.
- IV. Explain how the development of health service buildings and education institutions contribute to displacement.
- V. Explain how UP can help foster racial integration both on campus and for the community of Portland.
